- · Students failing to submit assignments or scoring below acceptable 70% are assigned to Homework Club for additional assistance & accountability
- · Weekly teacher-supported study hall and more flexible options for struggling students added
- · All students receive one--on--one math tutoring provided by qualified teachers

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

· Character Training woven throughout school's curric ulum; school

operates on premise that academics are a tool to teach principles of good character.
